Liability Insurance, How to get it

Caller Liability Insurance

The Lloyd Shaw Foundation, as an affiliate member of CALLERLAB, is pleased to be able to offer LSF members “callers” personal liability insurance coverage for only **\$35**. The **term of the insurance begins April 1 and ends the following March 31st. It must be renewed annually by April 1 to remain in force. The member is responsible for renewing this annual coverage.** The price for succeeding years may increase, and if so, this will be updated on our web page.

As a member of The Lloyd Shaw Foundation, callers, cuers, and prompters calling in the United States have access to group liability insurance through the Foundation's affiliate membership with CALLERLAB. You do not need to be a member of CALLERLAB. However, **you must be a current member of The Lloyd Shaw Foundation.** Please note that this is **NOT** music licensing. The yearly cost is **\$35.00** and covers personal liability only. It is your responsibility to renew this annually before April 1st of each year.

ALBUQUERQUE DANCE CENTER NEWS

Yes, unfortunately we are still closed due to social distancing and we do not have a date at the present time. It is unfortunate that the pandemic has gone on for so long.

I would like to give the dancers and leaders some information on the reasons for the guidelines that we have in place.

First Guideline: we have installed in the center refrigerated air which is much different than a swamp cooler. In order to receive the effectiveness of refrigerated air all doors must be closed. Why?? Well, if cooler air enters the center from the outside then it triggers the heater to go on. When that happens then there is no way to reverse it and the dance space is now hot! Also, it will not help at all to remove some of the cinder blocks near the top of the roof to bring in air!

Also, folks may wonder the reason of having to move the AC thermometers into the office. Unfortunately, the keys to the units are universal and folks were opening the locked units to change the temperature. This happened to be a very unwise decision as the temperature needed to be regulated according to the size of the dance halls. If the required temperature were changed then it could cause a drastic change in the units on the roof, and they would need to be repaired for a cost.

Second guideline: So far, most dancers and leaders are doing a great job in leaving their water bottles in the kitchen area. This is very important especially if we have even a small water spill on our super dance floor. Any amount of water could damage the floor in that area and the entire floor would need to be refinished so that area is the same feel as the rest of the floor. Unfortunately, that runs into a large amount of funds to repair. In addition, the floor is left with a very powerful smell for about 2 weeks. This is a problem for groups that use the center and for the professional private dance teachers who are earning a living. So, it is important for the dance leaders, board members, or directors to monitor the placement of any containers of water or other liquids.

Third guideline: If your group serves any food, especially fruit, it is important to remove **all** trash from the center. Several years ago, someone left a lot of half-eaten fruit in the trash cans. It brought in a large bunch of fruit flies and so many that the yellow wall in the kitchen was completely covered in black. I was smashing the fruit flies as a member of another dance group was making some red sugar punch. Fruit flies were climbing on the wall and other flies were diving into the punch. Folks received a little extra protein that night! Unfortunately, watermelon is banned! Seeds are usually flying everywhere, and the juice is dripping all over the counters and the floor. It is a mess and it resulted in clogged drains in both bathrooms years ago!

These guidelines may have generated a good laugh and yes there is a lot of humor in my report, but these are true situations. Possibly you have some situations that you would like to write about in your adventures at your dance hall! Hope you enjoyed this report!!!!

CONTRA CORNER

Contras – a pair by Don Armstrong

Taken from Don's book, *The Sets in Order American Square Dance Society Presents: The Caller/Teacher Manual for Contras with 101 ready-to-call contras* published in 1973.

Words or syllables in **bold** should be said on the beat.

St. Vrain Creek

Formation: Contra lines, 1, 3, 5, etc., couples active and crossed over. This dance has a double progression so each set should have an even number of couples. The crossovers at the head and foot of the set are automatic and need not be called.

Music: Any well phrased 64 count reel.

Prompts

Intro - - - -, **Everybody forward and back**

1-8 - - - -, **Corners do sa do and bow**

9-16 - - - -, - - **Star thru**

17-24 - - **Rock forward and back**, - - **circle four**

25-32 - - - -, **Full around** then **ladies chain**

33-40 - - - -, **With** the **music chain** them **back**

41-48 - - - -, **All** pass **thru** and **turn alone** (the automatic crossover occurs at this point each time through the dance)

49-56 - - - -, **Those** who **can** right and **left** thru **home**.

Note from Don Armstrong: This dance was written originally in waltz rhythm while walking back down the St. Vrain Creek in Colorado with a creel full of fine trout. It is fun to dance to almost any rhythm and most callers use a reel. In $\frac{3}{4}$ time it is a fine, flowing contra and may be a bit faster. Try it! (Shaw 180 works very well.)

Monterrey Special

Formation: Contra lines, 1, 3, 5, etc., couples active and crossed over.

Music: Any well phrased 64 count reel.

Prompts:

Intro - - - -, **With** the **corner do sa do**

1-8 - - - -, **Right** to the **corner balance twice**

9-16 - - - -, **Pass** by the **right everybody march**

17-24 - - - -, **Turn** and **then** come **back** to **her**

25-32 - - **Allemande left**, - - **ladies chain**

33-40 - - - -, **With** the **music chain** them **back**

41-48 - - - -, - - **Slow** square **thru*** (caller indicates Cross Over every second and alternate sequence through the dance.)

49-56 (**Right two cha cha cha**, (**Left two cha cha cha**) – these are Cadence calls, not prompts)

*Using four counts per hand (try “step, 2, step/close, step” or “step, 2, cha, cha, cha”) dancers do a full square thru, 16 counts total, pulling straight by on the last hand so that all dancers (except the temporarily “dead” couples) end by facing a new one below (corner) actives facing down, inactives facing up to start again.

Note from Don Armstrong: This dance was written at Asilomar, the site of the American Square Dance Society’s Square Dance Vacation Institutes. Asilomar is on the beautiful Monterey Peninsula overlooking the Pacific in Northern California.

And now, a good beginner’s couples round dance.

LEFT FOOTER'S ONE STEP

Formation: A circle of couples in semi-closed position.

Music: LS 3315

Footwork: Opposite throughout; M's L, W's R.

Measures:

- 1 - 2 WALK, 2, 3, 4 (face); SIDE, CLOSE, SIDE, CLOSE;
Start L ft and walk fwd in LOD 4 steps turning to face partner during the 4th step and taking closed dance position; step to L side in LOD on L ft, close R ft to L taking wt on R ft, step again to L side in LOD on L ft, close R ft to L taking wt on R ft while turning to face in LOD in semi-closed dance position.
- 3 - 4 Repeat action of Meas. 1 and 2, except to end in closed pos. M's back to COH;
- 5 - 6 BACK IN, 2, 3, 4; SIDE, CLOSE, SIDE, CLOSE;
Start L ft and walk bwd twd COH 4 short steps; do two side-close steps in LOD starting L ft as in Meas. 2.
- 7 - 8 WALK OUT, 2, 3, 4; SIDE, CLOSE, SIDE, CLOSE (to sidecar);
Start L ft and walk fwd twd wall 4 short steps; do two side-close steps in LOD starting L ft as in Meas. 2 except to end with L hips adjacent (sidecar pos.), M facing RLOD and W facing LOD.
- 9 -10 BACKWARD, 2, 3, 4 (face); SIDE, CLOSE, SIDE, CLOSE (to banjo);
Start L ft and walk bwd 4 steps in LOD turning to face partner in closed position during the 4th step; do two side-close steps in LOD starting L ft as in Meas. 2 except to end with R hips adjacent (banjo pos.), M facing LOD and W facing RLOD.
- 11-12 FORWARD, 2, 3, 4 (face); SIDE, CLOSE, SIDE, CLOSE (to semi-closed);
Start L ft and walk fwd in LOD 4 steps turning to face partner during the 4th step and taking closed position; do two side-close steps in LOD starting L ft as in Meas. 2, ending in semi-closed position facing in LOD.
- 13 -14 WALK, 2, TURN, POINT; WALK, 2, TURN, POINT;
Start L ft and walk fwd in LOD 3 steps, L, R, L, turning in twd partner to face RLOD during the 3rd step, point R toe fwd to floor; start R ft and walk fwd in RLOD 3 steps, R, L, R, turning in twd partner to face LOD during the 3rd step, point L toe fwd to floor.

15 – 16 BALANCE FORWARD, AND BACK; TWIRL, 2, 3, 4 (to semi-closed);

Start L ft and do a two-step balance fwd in LOD, start R ft and do a two-step balance bwd in RLOD; as M walks alongside with 4 steps starting on L ft, W makes a R face twirl with 4 steps while progressing in LOD, to end with partners taking semi-closed position facing LOD, ready to repeat the dance.


Mary Jo Brearley: Though she passed away in 2020, we were only recently made aware of it. We send our deepest condolences to John and the extended family. Below is her obituary:

MEMORIES OF MARIE

Anne Marie Lowrey Armstrong Stewart
August 1, 1920 - April 21, 2021

Many of us have super memories of vibrant, talented, sparkling, lovable Marie, who was born and grew up in North Carolina and who lived a life full of adventures, travel, guitar-playing, singing, calling, teaching, helping to produce the first LSF dance kits – all fueled by the dances and music she loved.

During World War II, Marie, stationed in Fairbanks, Alaska, worked for the USO and became involved with local community singing and dancing groups. At a folk dance she met a man, once a Cheyenne Mountain dancer, who gave her

a copy of Cowboy Dances. She called her first square dance, "Red River Valley," in Fairbanks. Music and dance were the center of her life from then on.

After the war, Marie returned to North Carolina, where she met Don Armstrong at the 1954 Emory University dance camp in Georgia; they married three months later, and began decades of sharing their love of dance across the country and around the world: teaching, calling, enjoying. Marie preferred calling contras to squares. They became involved with the annual Lloyd Shaw Fellowship in Colorado, and with its program for teaching dance leaders.

In 1960 Marie began 25 years of summer work at Peaceful Valley, a guest ranch and lodge in the Colorado Rockies not far from Estes Park, Marie led folk dancing and singing, trail rides, hikes, excursions, picnics and other activities for guests. Don spent the summers calling one-night stands and taking time off for fishing, stopping off for Saturday nights at P.V. whenever he could.

We met Marie and Don around 1970 at the Lloyd Shaw Fellowship Week, where Marie specialized in leading our singing sessions. We remember the round "Pauper sum ego, Nihil habeo, Cor meum dabo" ("Poor am I, Nothing have I, I give you my heart") as a particular favorite.

In 1986, Marie convinced the owners of Peaceful Valley to hire Bill for one of the ranch's two-week summer dance-caller stints, which we did for the next nine years. We loved being part of the staff with Marie, and learned so much from her about working with all kinds of people, making their lives happier. That is our strong memory of her still: her love and acceptance of everybody, everywhere, as she shared her delight in dance and song.

We enjoyed visits with Marie and Don when they lived in Colorado and later in Missouri, where Don died in 2000. Marie moved back to her birthplace Oak Ridge, North Carolina, and several years later married an old high school friend, David Stewart, with whom she happily aged until his death in 2019. In her later years, we had opportunities to touch base with her as she continued to serve others in her wider community. She called us one day from her retirement

community asking for help in obtaining music which she wanted to use to teach her fellow retirement neighbors. She said they weren't thriving and needed some stimulation in their lives. She felt that even though she was 99 years old, she'd be able to help her neighbors be more active doing some rhythm activities, singing, and dancing together.

That was Marie all over. Vibrant, out-going, and loving to the very last. Even in the face of the pandemic, she was determined to open new vistas to her aging neighbors. What a woman! We're glad she got to celebrate her 100th birthday with family and friends in 2020.

The following dances are in honor of Marie Armstrong-Stewart. Marie said the first square she ever called was Red River Valley while she was in Fairbanks, Alaska during the war (in the 40s). This was mentioned in an interview she did with David Glick in 2014. That's on the Sq Dance History site (Millstone). The file name is DSCN8891.mov

Red River Valley (1947)

Editor's note: this is the oldest rendition Bob & Allynn Riggs found in their collection, and likely the square dance Marie Armstrong called. It is from an album of four double sided 78 rpm records *Country Dances*, music played by The Top Hands with calls by Ed Durlacher. There is an accompanying book with calls and directions as well as sheet music for piano. See images on the next page.

(1) Head couples to the Right and you Circle.

Couples one and three go to the couples on their right, join hands in a ring and circle once around to the left.

(2) And You Swing with the Other Fellow's Girl.

Exchange Partners and Swing.

(3) Now You Step right Back and you Honor.

Stop Swinging, step back two steps and Honor.

(4) Then you Swing Your Own Red River Girl.

All Swing Partners.

(5) Head Couples to the Center and you Circle.

Couples one and three now meet in the center of the set, join hands and circle one around to the left.

(6) And you Swing with the Other Fellow's Girl.

As in (2).

(7) Now You Step right Back and you Honor.

As in (3)

(8) Then you Swing Your Own Red River Girl.

As in (4).

(9) Lead on to the Right and you Circle.

Couple one goes to Couple four and couple three to couple two and circle once around to the Left.

(10) And you Swing with the Other Fellow's Girl.

As in (2).

(11) Now You Step right Back and you Honor.

As in (3)



(12) Then you Swing Your Own Red River Girl.

As in (4).

(13) Promenade.

All cross hands in skating position and walk once around the set counter-clockwise to own place.

Side Couples do the dance (1) through (13) after the Chorus.



Red River Valley (1960)

Editor's note: A similar dance was found in a notebook with dates from 1960-1962 that belonged to Allynn Riggs' father, Ray Boyd, who began calling in the 1940s and retired from calling in the 1990s. The notes were from at least three caller training schools, and included many dances. The handwritten calls are transcribed below. There were no specific directions or explanations.

Intro, Break, & Closer

It's a left hand round your partner.
Corner gals let's all do-sa-do.
Now go back home and do-sa-do with your partner.
Then grand right and left you go.
Now it's a do-sa-do again when you meet her.
Then you swing that darlin' round and round.
Promenade – Promenade round that valley – Promenade that
little gal round the town.

Figure (four times through total)

All 4 gents you march around the outside.
Swing with the gal across the way.
All 4 ladies star across the inside
And swing with the gal who went away.
Head couple promenade $\frac{1}{2}$ the inside.
Side couple right & left thru home.
All 4 gents swing your darling corner lady –
And keep that darling for your own.

She graduated from Will Rogers High School in the class of 1947, then earned B.A. (1951) and M.A. (1954) degrees in English from the University of Tulsa.

She taught high school English in Lamar, Colorado, for a year before earning her M.A., and then moved to Syracuse, New York, to study for a PhD in English literature at Syracuse University. She also was a staff member at the Syracuse YWCA. She met Harrington C. Brearley, Jr., an electrical engineer at General Electric in Syracuse, at a YWCA gathering, and the two were married on December 28, 1957. They had three children: Ann, born in Syracuse; William, born in Champaign-Urbana, where Harry taught at the University of Illinois; and Caroline, born in Ames, where Harry taught at Iowa State University.

Mary Jo lived in Ames from 1965 until her death. During that time, she was active in the League of Women Voters, serving as its co-president (2002-2004); at Collegiate Presbyterian Church, serving on Session; in the Ames Octagon; in several book clubs, and in many other civic and artistic organizations. She took courses in accounting, which she enjoyed, and worked as a seasonal tax preparer in the 1970's. In 1980, she resumed her English teaching career as an instructor of freshman English at Iowa State University, continuing until her retirement in the 1990's.

Mary Jo's lifelong love of dancing began with her parents who were square dance callers in Tulsa. Mary Jo and her brother Johnny performed dance exhibitions, taught dance at summer camps in the Colorado mountains, and served as a demonstration couple for dance pioneer Lloyd Shaw's dance leader classes in Colorado Springs. Later in life, in Ames, Mary Jo called square dances and taught ballroom dancing for various church and community groups. She danced with local contra dance, English Country dance, and Scottish dance groups in Ames into her eighties, and played piano for the Onion Creek Cloggers Band in her seventies and eighties. In addition to dance, Mary Jo loved music, playing the piano, violin and guitar, and singing. She was also a true

bookworm and could devour a novel in a night. She nurtured a love of music, dance, and books in all three of her children.

Mary Jo is survived by her children, Ann (Chris Hagen) Brearley of Plymouth, MN, William (Katie Sanger) Brearley of Ballston Lake, NY, and Caroline (Steve Meyer) Brearley of Stuttgart, Germany; her grandchildren, Rachel Hagen, Russell Brearley, Hannah Hagen, Anastasia Meyer, and Katya Meyer; and her brother John (Nita) Bradford of Lakewood, Colorado. She was preceded in death by her husband Harrington.

Marie Lowrey Armstrong Stewart, 100, died Wednesday, April 21, 2021. She was born August 1, 1920, the daughter of the late Samuel Coy and Ina Dillon Lowrey of Oak Ridge. Also preceding her in death were husband, Donald Armstrong; husband, David Carlton Stewart, Sr.; her brother, Sgt. Samuel Coy Lowrey Jr. USMC; her sisters, Bille Lowrey Redman, and Janie Lowrey Clendenin. Surviving are her brother, Thad Moore Lowrey and his wife, Bobbie of New Port Richey Florida; step-daughter, Terry Armstrong Stanley of Port Richey Florida, step-daughter-in-law, Willie Moore Armstrong of Marshall Missouri; and a host of other family members.

Marie graduated from Summerfield High School at 14 and then attended Salem College. Later, she moved to Washington D.C. working as a secretary for an Army official. With her late husband Don, Marie danced all over the world: teaching square dancing, contra, and folk dancing. She traveled to more than 80 countries and every continent. They introduced the first radio station to New Port Richey Florida in 1963 and developed properties in Grand Cayman and Costa Rica. Marie became fluent in Spanish at age 55. After Don's death she returned to Oak Ridge and continued her community involvement.

A staunch supporter of Oak Ridge Military Academy, she played a significant role in the development of the Academy's museum. Her work there was reported in the Northwest Observer on her 90th birthday. After reading the article, David Stewart contacted her. They resumed a pre-war courtship and were married within a year.

An active member of the Oak Ridge Presbyterian Church, Marie volunteered at Urban Ministry and sang in the choir. One of her greatest joys was teaching Spanish to 4-year-olds at the Presbyterian pre-school. As a trustee of the Old Union Graveyard, she successfully petitioned the town of Oak Ridge to assume control of the graveyard to ensure its perpetuity. Family history was also a passion. When she returned to Oak Ridge, she began to research the genealogy of the Lowrey family; documenting to 1749 including the Revolutionary War.

Marie was a member of the W.O.W. Circle of the Presbyterian Church, P.E.O. and D.A.R. A memorial service will be held at Oak Ridge Presbyterian Church on Tuesday May 4th at 11:00 AM (Covid protocols will be observed). Inurnment to follow at 2:00 PM at Union Grove Baptist Church.
